## SUMMARY

## Patrycja Cembrzyńska THIS HELLISH BUS, POLAND (FOOTNOTES TO B. W. LINKE)

The paper discusses allegorical representations of Poland referring to the motif of a red bus. The discussion concentrates on the painting Bus (1961) by Bronisław Wojciech Linke and references to this work (performances of the Academy of Movement from the 1970s, the song Bus by Jacek Kaczmarski from 1981, and the novel March, Polonia by Jerzy Pilch from 2008). Linke's painting has been interpreted as a vote of no confidence to communist world and at the same time a supplement to the allegorical image of Poland as a sinking ship, known from the Diet Sermons by Fr Piotr Skarga. The motif of the bus is watched as revitalized by political actualities. After 1989 the red bus appears as a phantom of communism (in Pilch's novel and in the collage Świetlicki's Cities by Alicja Biała) and simultaneously transforming into the token of "pop-communism". The reconstruction of the migration route of the motif corroborates the theory of Michael Billinge that national identity is reproduced, in fact, by banal figures.
