**Abstract:**

Over the past two years the Court of Justice of the European Union has delivered several important rulings on legal instruments forming the framework of the so-called judicial cooperation in civil matters. Therefore, European civil procedure law remains one of the most vibrant areas of European integration. The two-part article contains a detailed and comprehensive study of the CJEU’s *acquis* within the framework of basic legal instruments underpinning the EU Common Judicial Area, including all “Brussels” Regulations, the Insolvency Regulation and the Succession Regulation among others. The authors pay close attention to the mechanisms of cooperation between Member States and the EU; analysing not only the technical issues raised by the cases pending before the CJEU, but also highlighting the importance of underlying constitutional and cross-border aspects.
