"GHOSTWRITING" FIREWALL

While submitting a manuscript in order for it to be published in the KPP, the author declares that they have authored it and that they retain full (exclusive) copyright ownership and moral rights over their work.

If a submitted manuscript has been co-authored, the person submitting it for publication declares that persons identified as authors retain copyright ownership and moral rights over their work. Furthermore, the person submitting a manuscript for publication details the respective contributions of individual authors. Such person is liable and responsible for the accuracy of information on the respective authors' contributions.

"Ghostwriting" and "Guest authorship" constitute breaches of research ethics.

"Ghostwriting" is a practice whereby the efforts of a person who has contributed substantially to the paper are not recognised, as such person is not named as author or co-author and their contribution is not specified in the acknowledgement section.

"Guest authorship" ("honorary authorship") is a practice whereby the contribution of a person to the paper is either insignificant or there is no contribution by such person at all, yet such person is nevertheless named as the author or co-author of the paper.

If it is ascertained that the person submitting a manuscript for publication infringes upon copyright or moral rights of third parties or provides inaccurate information about persons who have contributed to the paper, the Editorial Department refuses to publish the manuscript or, where the paper has already been published, informs the public to that effect in the next issue of the KPP. The head of an organisational unit employing a person who has committed such infringement or provided inaccurate authorship information is notified about the infringement or about the detected misconduct.
